## Pre-Tournament – will there be a Reycup?

After this exciting preparation period I was already tired before the tournament started. But as I reached Reykjavik and our friends at Þróttur. I was happy and glad that I didn't cancel.

It was also good to get out a bit because of all the restrictions we had to live with for so many weeks.

# The REFEX-referees

Like the year before we wanted to go with 5 referees to Iceland. 3 talented referees from Spain planned to take part in Reycup and enjoy this fascinating island afterwards. Due to Corona-Crisis they had to cancel a few weeks before. I could read in their email how sad they have been.

After their cancellation I tried to acquire some new referees. 3 refereees from Belgium showed much interest. But in the end they weren't able to participate either because Belgiums COVID-regulation wanted each tourist that came home to stay in quarantine for 2 weeks afterwards.

But compared to some years ago, we could also see the development of Icelandic football. In previous years we always said that they play very physical (but fair) with lots of running and duels. Like I said before, there was a bit more to do. So in the end my personal tournament record went up from 27 games to 29 games. There were also 5 games I had to do alone.
